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## New summer family program "Marching Toward Medicine" at the Museum of Health Care

(KINGSTON, Ont.) – This summer, history buffs age eight and up can learn about medical innovations during wartime at the Museum of Health Care's new summer family program.

According to program creators Beatrice D'Angelo and Danielle Ruffolo, *Marching Toward Medicine* allows participants to explore wartime innovations in health care during the War of 1812, the Crimean War, and both World Wars.

"Participants can travel back in time and step into the shoes of Canada's heroes on and off the battlefield and see how historical wars changed the way we think of medicine today," says Ms Ruffalo.

"The program offers a series of hands-on activities, including mixing medicines, performing rehabilitation exercises, battlefield surgeon role-playing, reproducing medals, and making soldiers' and nurses' hats," adds Ms D'Angelo.

The two-hour program is recommended for ages eight and up (younger children are welcome to attend if accompanied by an adult) and is offered twice on Sunday, July 29<sup>th</sup> and Sunday, August 12<sup>th</sup> at 10:00 am to noon, or 2:00 pm to 4:00 pm at the Museum of Health Care at Kingston (32 George Street).
