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Our Sensational Senses summer program



(KINGSTON, ON) – This August children 6 and up have the chance to immerse their senses in a fun learning experience at the Museum of Health Care's new summer program.

Our Sensational Senses was designed to treat all five senses with games, snacks, and crafts, while teaching children about the science and changing use of sight, sound, touch, smell, and taste in health care history.

"How did doctors in the 1800s use their five senses to diagnose patients?" Program creators Melissa Sit and Tabitha Renaud will help kids explore this question using the Museum's

collection of artefacts and five different Sense Stations. "Kids will see similarities and differences between diagnostic practices," says Ms. Renaud. "Doctors still rely heavily on eyesight to see pox and rashes, but they no longer taste a patient's urine."

Station activities will include smelling herbal remedies, making eyeglasses from pipe cleaner, creating personalized Braille name cards, listening to a stethoscope, and tasting a historical snack. Kids will put the knowledge together at the end of the program with a take-home puzzle.

The two-hour program will take place in the Museum's newly-renovated space for kids. "The five sense theme was chosen to compliment the Museum's new Children's Gallery, which will soon feature an exhibit on skin," explains Ms. Sit.

Our Sensational Senses summer program is offered twice on Sunday, August 7th and Sunday, August 14th at 10:00 am to noon, or 2:00 pm to 4:00 pm at the Museum of Health Care at Kingston (32 George Street, Ann Baillie Building National Historic Site).
